# LET US PRAY ON IT

Imagine having a problem you need to deal with or a challenge you are facing. How do you approach it? Well if we're honest with ourselves, many of us willfully ignore that challenge, choosing instead to let time heal its wounds until the next moment we are confronted by that same challenge. Yet even those of us who by default choose to let nature takes its course find ourselves at certain moments really wanting to find an answer to that challenge. A part of each of us, even if it's only a small part, wants to change. And as we begin a new year (granted, a "secular" year) the desire that permeated our lives in late September to do t'shuavah, to return to our true selves, returns to the forefront of our minds.



So if we agree (albeit tenuously) that even for the most stubborn of us this time of year motivates us to change, I ask again...how do we approach that change?

In our saturated media culture, one only needs to google the issues we are facing to discover the ten best tips to overcome them. All of the information we need is at our fingertips. We just need to point, click, and browse.


But the religious imagination is not as quick to assume that simply having information at our disposal is the solution to our challenges. Rather the religious imagination says that our response needs to be a step before collecting information; it needs to be a step in the direction of prayer.

Countless times throughout our tradition, in Talmudic, medieval, and <u>Hassidic</u> thinking, the term for "prayer" (t'fillah) is connected to the root for "listening" (sh'ma). This should not come as a surprise. For instance, the weekday Amidah includes the blessing "Blessed be God who hears prayers" (shomea t'filah). More famously, the principal prayer (or affirmation) that resonates through every Jewish soul is called...the Sh'ma. What's more, the relationship between listening and praying is extended to mean that listening is an important act of prayer. Just because we add many words to our prayers doesn't mean that God will hear them (Isaiah 1:15) and even if we blow our prayers through the loud sound of the shofar, the sound that comes back to us may only be a "still small voice" (Un'taneh Tokef in Rosh Hashanah liturgy). In other words, when we're praying on an issue, what we're really doing is actively listening to hear the subtle sounds around us that can point us in the right direction, the sounds that emanate from God.

And perhaps that's the rub of prayer – that prayer is inherently connected to hearing (and devoting ourselves) to God (see Rambam's Introduction to Laws of Prayer). For many of us, hearing God is almost as difficult (if not more) than deciding to try and change. It's much easier to ignore trying to see God's presence than actively pursuing God's presence, especially when the central act of that pursuit is the difficult one of listening. Yet despite all of our misgivings about God, despite all of the times of the year that we might wonder whether or not God is here and whether or not God can hear, perhaps there are certain times when we can push ourselves to find God, to push ourselves to listen for God's still small voice, to push ourselves to let God change our lives for the better. Maybe there is a time when faced with a challenge, we can take a moment, no matter how short, to pray on it. And maybe, just maybe, that prayer will lead us to change.

May each of us have a happy, healthy, and prayerful 2015.

## **Decision time is here!**

With most of the planning complete, it is now time to know if there is enough support to pursue booking the Argentina trip (**November 1-10, 2015**).

**The base cost per person is \$2,350.** This is based on a commitment by <u>20-24 people</u>. This cost does <u>not</u> include airfare for both roundtrip flights to Buenos Aires and Igauzu Falls. (As of December 22nd, **airfare was approximately \$1,600**.)

The tour company (Isram) has arranged a very full itinerary, including these tours:

- 1 day at a Gaucho ranch, including a kosher dinner
- a 1/2 day boat trip on the Tigre River
- a Tango show, including a kosher dinner
- a Jewish heritage tour
- a tour of the Opera House
- a city tour of Buenos Aires
- 2 nights at the UNESCO heritage site at Iguazu Falls
- PLUS, Rabbi Saks is arranging a shared Shabbat evening at one of the premier synagogues in Buenos Aires.

What a priceless opportunity to experience the culture of Argentina with our synagogue family, and with Rabbi Saks leading the group!

Each congregant may bring a non-member to travel with. **The cost for a non-member will be \$2,450.** The additional \$100 covers the synagogue's expenses.

The most current draft of the itinerary has been sent to congregants' homes. Please review it to understand the value and opportunity that is being presented.

A verbal commitment is needed by January 15th and a \$100 deposit (per person) by January 31st. The deposit will be counted towards the base cost per person of the trip.
