From the Rabbi

Hanukkah is known as the Festival of Lights because its central ritual is the lighting of the *Chanukkiah* (Hanukkah menorah) for eight consecutive nights. We commemorate Chanukah to celebrate the inspirational story of the unlikely Maccabean victory over their Syrian-Greek oppressors who attempted to obliterate the Jewish faith and convert the Jews to Hellenism in 165 B.C.E.

The story is told of the miracle which occurred when Judah the Maccabee ordered the Temple to be cleansed and purified. The Talmud tells of a legend in which there was only enough oil found in the Temple to light the menorah for one day, yet it burned for eight days. The time needed there to create more pure oil. An eight-day festival was declared by the Jewish sages to commemorate this miracle. In actuality, Hanukkah is more likely an eight day festival because they Maccabees were unable to celebrate Sukkot and Simchat Torah, (an eight day celebration), earlier in the year. Hanukkah was made as an eight day festival to make up for the time they could not celebrate.

I choose to believe a bit of both stories. The Maccabees knew the land, giving them an advantage over the Syrian-Greeks. Perhaps, the oil did miraculously last eight days or perhaps this group of people spent the earlier fall holidays in battle and did not want to miss out on an opportunity to come together and to praise God. The miracle is that t we come together, we celebrate and bring more light into our world. We acknowledge our difference and rejoice in our similarities.

As we light the *chanukkiah*, notice that when one candle shares its light with another, neither is diminished, they both grow. So too is our joy. May our light and happiness grow ever brighter.

Lighting the Hanukkah Candles

Candles are lit on each of the eight nights of Hanukkah. One the first night, two the second, and an additional candle on each subsequent night. The candle for the first night is placed at the far right of the *hanukkiah*; on each subsequent night, another candle is added to the left. An extra candle, designated as the "*shamash*" is lit first, then used to light the others after the blessings are recited.

Praised are You Adonai our God, who rules the universe, instilling in us the holiness of mitzvot by commanding us to light the lights of Hanukkah.

On the first night only:

These lights which we kindle recall the wondrous triumphs and the miraculous victories wrought through Your holy Kohanim for our ancestors from ancient days until our time. These lights are sacred through all the eight days of Hanukkah. We may not make use of their light, but are only to look upon them, and thus be reminded to thank and praise You for the wondrous miracle of our deliverance.






