

I rarely follow sports, especially golf. I really only know that the Super Bowl is about to happen because I see signs about it in the grocery store. Many people find camaraderie, excitement, and exhilaration watching a sports team and cheering on with fans from around the world. Not me, especially football, I just do not feel that joy. I do appreciate the stories of the athletes' lives and how hard they work to get onto that professional or college team.

This is one of those stories. Last year, ESPN showed a great documentary called "A Mountain to Climb" about a golfer Pratima Sherpa. She is 18 and her dream is to become the first female golf pro from Nepal. Sherpa and her parents have lived in a dilapidated maintenance shed at Royal Nepal Golf Club since she was 5 years old. Sherpa calls it her "lucky house" because, "If I don't live there, I cannot play golf."

With no money for real clubs, her father went into the woods and carved a wooden club for her to use. Eventually, club members gave her a set of clubs, and she practiced constantly. Her father, Pasang Sherpa, wasn't sure that was a good idea.

"I told her to stop playing," he said. "I told her to study. This game is for the wealthy, well-to-do people. It wasn't meant for us." But as she piles up trophies, her talent can't be denied. This is a story of someone who has not just defied the odds but has defied the social construct and order to succeed.

Let us be inspired by her fortitude and her story. Join us at Beth Mordecai and tell our story. Each one of us has continued to work at something even when others told us we wouldn't succeed. 




In The Golem and the Jinni, a chance meeting between mythical beings takes readers on a dazzling journey through cultures in turn-of-the-century New York.

Chava is a golem, a creature made of clay, brought to life by a disgraced rabbi who dabbles in dark Kabbalistic magic and dies at sea on the voyage from Poland. Chava is unmoored and adrift as the ship arrives in New York harbor in 1899.

Ahmad is a jinni, a being of fire born in the ancient Syrian desert, trapped in an old copper flask, and released in New York City, though still not entirely free.

Ahmad and Chava become unlikely friends and soul mates with a mystical connection. Marvelous and compulsively readable, Helene Wecker's debut novel The Golem and the Jinni weaves strands of Yiddish and Middle Eastern literature, historical fiction and magical fable, into a wondrously inventive and unforgettable tale.
