A few months ago on a Shabbat morning, one of our members, Norman Silverstein and I were talking. He asked if I have Netflix. With kids, it is practically a requirement! Norman asked if I had heard of this show that is new to Netflix called Shtisel. I had not. Currently, there are two seasons on Netflix, and it is phenomenal! The show tells the story of an Ultra-Orthodox family living in Jerusalem giving the viewer a deep into their life. The dialogue is in Hebrew and Yiddish, with subtitles.

There are many different things that I love about this show, and I urge you to watch it. When we look at another community, especially one very different from ours we make assumptions. This Ultra-Ultra-Orthodox community looks like homogenous group from the outside. Yet, when we look closer, we see the individuals. The relationships between the characters are as complicated as are our own.

Each one of the characters struggle with their own desires the requirements of the community and where those two clash. They both feel restricted and supported by the laws and norms of their society. This Israeli show gives an incredibly touching and exciting look into the many unique characters.

Shtisel is a scripted show, and as such, I could not know how accurate it is to any specific Ultra-Orthodox community. Still, the writing and the drama are excellent, the plot lines are fascinating and it is nice to the Hebrew and the Yiddish dialogue.

The next time you are looking for something to watch on Netflix, turn on Shtissel. Once you watch a few episodes, you too will be transported to a different world. You will see that even though people may look and dress the same, they each have their hopes, dreams, and difficulties. After you watch it, let me know which parts were striking to you.

I look forward to discussing their Judaism and yours.
